

# Thank You

To all the parents who have emailed or spoken to our staff and management team thanking us for the work we did and continue to do during the lockdown I would like to say how much it is appreciated. There is a lovely feeling of singular purpose among our parents and teachers to ensure that St Thomas's School returns to normality as soon as possible and continues to be the heart of the community.

As we successfully complete the first week back on our school site it is timely to reflect on how it is all going.

We had over 95% student attendance this week which is above average for this time of year and indicates that parents are comfortable with the COVID-19 procedures that the school has put in place. Teachers have worked on settling students back into school and focused on wellbeing as well as academic learning. Generally speaking, students have returned in a settled state and we have used our special needs coordinator and school counsellor to catch up with individuals who needed a little extra support. There is no sign of heightened anxiety among our students at this stage.

Indeed the Learning from Home survey which 344 of our students completed, had 85% of students indicate that they felt their home bubble was doing well, had adults at home they could talk to if worried (87%) and that they felt safe from COVID-19 while learning at home (86%). Parents and

caregivers, you need to give yourself a pat on the back for safely steering your families through the lock down and managing the stress in such a way as not to impact on your children.

As this week has progressed, we have opened up our sports shed, and students are enjoying the freedom of our fields. Next week our sports coordinator, Devish, will organise a sports programme to get our students more involved in outdoor activities as we return to normality. We will also expand our teaching bubbles and teachers can buddy up with another classroom for collaborative teaching.

The most surprising aspect of returning to school is the positive feedback from parents and staff about students only allowed to access the school after 8:30 in the morning. Parents, particularly in the junior areas have been very positive about their children arriving after 8:30 and then walking into school on their own. This has made for a smoother transition as students have quickly adapted to leaving their parents at the gate and dashing into school to catch up with their friends and teachers. One little 5-year-old remarked to his teacher that the best thing about this week was that he could walk into school on his own. For teachers it has meant that they can continue uninterrupted with preparation for the day ahead and meet within their teams. They have noticed a marked difference in how students are ready to engage with their learning straight away and students seem far more settled. The caretakers have appreciated the time it allows them to mow the lawns, use weed eaters and other noisy equipment before children arrive on the site. These were unexpected but pleasing outcomes from having the gates closed until 8:30 and something that we may

continue as we move to lift the current restrictions of Alert Level 2. Of course we still want to maintain St Thomas's School as a welcoming community and after easing of the current restrictions we will again allow access after 3:00 so parents can come onto the grounds and pick up their children if needed.

## **Survey Results**

As mentioned above, results are back from our student Wellbeing and Learning Survey. The majority of students (79%) reported that they were able to learn at home, that teachers were providing feedback which helped with learning at home (71%), learning resources that the school had provided were useful and easy to use (71%), students knew how to contact their teacher if they needed help or have a problem (82%) and that 65% had enjoyed learning at home. The average score of how students rated their wellbeing during the lockdown was 80% and the average score for learning was 75%. Considering that distance learning was something that we had never tried to put in place across the school and only planned it in response to the lockdown these results were reassuring.

## **Construction Update**

The back entrance to the office area and staffroom is going to be fenced off to allow construction of a walkway from the new block to the administration area. Aline are planning to install temporary fencing between the front office and Allum Street to allow students and staff to access the office and staffroom safely. During the school day students and staff can enter the office from the front of the school and the temporary fence will prevent students from going near the road.

There will be gates in this temporary fence to allow parents to access the office area and for the students to enter and leave the school. The fencing will be removed once construction is complete at the rear of the office area.

## **New Staff**

Ricky Buchanan joined our staff as a Year 7 teacher. Ricky is an experienced New Zealand trained teacher from Dunedin who had to cut his travels in Europe short due to COVID-19. With a keen interest in the outdoors Ricky is a welcome addition to the senior area of our school.

# Queen's Birthday and Teacher Only Day

In 2019, all schools in New Zealand were allocated two teacher only days and our first one is scheduled for next Friday May 29<sup>th</sup>. On Friday the school will be closed to students and staff will be involved in professional development around wellbeing. It may seem strange to be closing for a day after only returning to school however this was planned from last year and is part of the Teacher's Collective Agreement.

## Are there any changes to Alert Level 2 in school next week?

No. We will continue with the gates opening and closing times. We will also continue with extra cleaning of surfaces in classrooms, hand sanitisers in rooms and no assemblies will be held. Students may notice some changes as two classes can choose to work collaboratively together, and sporting opportunities increase across the school. Next week we will update our current practices and share in our newsletter what the following two weeks are going to look like.

## **Junior Playground**

The playground is fenced off for safety reasons as there are wooden panels covering concrete piles and we do not want any accidents to happen. The contractors are due back this coming week to erect the canopy and work through the next stages.

We understand that students will be finding it hard having the playground out of action but hopefully it wont be for too much longer.

# To our School Community from the Board of Trustees

We hope you are doing OK in what has been a very troubling time for the country and the community with the outbreak of Covid-19 impacting our everyday lives.

At the school it has been a very busy and stressful time managing the school closure and re-entry over the past few weeks. It has not been easy navigating the advice from Government and balancing the health and safety, wellbeing and education needs of all our students, staff and our community.

Health and Safety of our students during this global pandemic is of paramount importance and at St Thomas's we also have the added pressure and associated hazard of a major construction site within the grounds of the school. This building site is operational 6 days per week at the moment as the construction company tries to make up some of the time lost over the recent lockdown.

With all of this in mind at this week's Board Meeting the Board unanimously voted to keep the school grounds closed after hours and on weekends. This means all entrances to the school grounds, including the gates to neighbours properties through our boundary fences, will be closed until further notice with entry to and exit from the school only through the controlled front entrances between 8.30-9am and 3.00-3.15pm on school days. At all other times everyone must go through the school office and sign in and out. If you need to meet with your child's teacher, we still encourage you to do so, we just ask that you please make an appointment and use the sign in process at the front office.

We know how much the school grounds are used and how much they are a hub to the community. Many board members themselves regularly use the grounds in weekends with their kids. We will therefore review this decision as soon as possible and as soon as it is deemed safe again, we will reopen the grounds to our community for everyone to enjoy.

Thanks for your understanding at this really tough time.
