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COVID-19 App

Last week the Ministry of Health released an update to the NZ COVID Tracer app so you can add manual entries to your digital diary, either at the time or afterward, regardless of whether a QR code is on display.

This means you can use the app to maintain a complete – and private – record of all the places you've been and the people you've seen.

Fast and effective contact tracing will be key to breaking the chain of transmission and minimising the risk or extent of any further lockdowns. NZ COVID Tracer supports this by giving contact tracers a head-start and by allowing us to send contact alerts to people who may have been exposed to the virus.

You can find a range of information about NZ COVID Tracer on the Ministry of Health <u>website</u>, including instructions on how to update the app if you don't have automatic updates enabled on your phone.

Tamaki College Enrolment Scheme

The Tamaki College Board of Trustees is in the process of implementing an enrolment scheme as directed by the Ministry of Eduction. Please see below for information on the proposed zone.

Tamaki College (57) ENROLMENT SCHEME

Effective 01 January 2021

The guidelines for development and operation of enrolment schemes are issued under section 11G (3) of the Education Act 1989 for the purpose of describing the basis on which the Secretary's powers in relation to enrolment schemes will be exercised.

Home zone

All students who live within the home zone* described below (and shown on the attached map) shall be entitled to enrol at the school.

Starting at the intersection of St Heliers Bay Road (excluded) and West Tamaki Road (odd addresses 1 and above only included) travel east along West Tamaki Road (Emerson Street, Ashby Avenue, Navarre Road, Washington Avenue, Crossfield Road, Roberta Avenue, Vanessa Crescent, Calder Place and California Place are excluded) to the end of West Tamaki Road (included). Continue south west along the coastline and then south to the Panmure Bridge/Lagoon Drive. Travel north west along Lagoon Drive (odd addresses 5-29 and Panmure Basin Foreshore excluded). At the intersection of Lagoon Drive and Ireland Road (excluded) turn right onto Jellicoe Road and travel north along Jellicoe Road (Pōtaka Lane excluded), then west along Mountain Road (excluded). From Mountain Road, follow Te Horeta Road north to Morrin Road (College Road and Stonefields Avenue excluded) then travel east to Merton Road (addresses 88 and 207 included only). Continue east to the railway line. Travel north along the railway line and then continue along the boundary of the Apirana Reserve (St Johns Road excluded). Travel across country to Apirana Avenue. From Apirana Avenue travel north west to St Heliers Bay Road (excluded). From St Heliers Bay Road travel north east back to the starting point.

*Proof of residence within the home zone may be required.

Each year, applications for enrolment for the following year from in-zone students will be sought by a specific date which will be published in a daily or community newspaper circulated in the area served by the school. This will enable the board to assess the number of places which can be made available to students who live outside the home zone.

Out of zone enrolments

Each year the board will determine the number of places which are likely to be available in the following year for the enrolment of students who live outside the home zone. The board will publish this information by notice in a daily or community newspaper circulated in the area served by the school.

The notice will indicate how applications are to be made and will specify a date by which all applications must be received.

Applications for enrolment will be processed in the following order of priority:

First priority: must be given to students who have been accepted for enrolment in the following

special programme(s) run by the school and approved by the Secretary for Education.**

<u>Second priority:</u> must be given to applicants who are siblings of current students.

<u>Third priority:</u> must be given to applicants who are siblings of former students.

<u>Fourth priority:</u> must be given to any applicant who is a child of a former student of the school.

Fifth priority: must be given to any applicant who is either a child of an employee of the board of the

school or a child of a member of the board of the school.

<u>Sixth priority:</u> must be given to all other applicants.

If there are more applicants in the second, third, fourth, or fifth priority groups than there are places available, selection within the priority group will be by a ballot conducted in accordance with instructions issued by the Secretary for Education under Section 11G(1) of the Education Act 1989. Parents will be informed of the date of any ballot by notice in a daily or community newspaper circulating in the area served by the school.

Applicants seeking second or third priority status may be required to give proof of a sibling relationship.

**Note: This priority category is not applicable at this school because the school does not run a special programme approved by the Secretary.
